Make it a rule in your car that you won't drive until everyone is buckled up properly. This goes for every trip, no matter how short or long. Don't try to fit more people in your car than you have seat belts for them to use.

The lap belt should be low across the hips and never over the stomach. The shoulder belt should be across your chest, never across the front of your neck, behind your back, or under your arm. Make sure the lap and shoulder belts are snug. On most vehicles, you can adjust the height of the shoulder belt near the driver door.
